Board Meetings of the Governors and Trustees, for the admission of Children, &c., are held quarterly.

- Fatherless Children, Motherless Children and Orphans are eligible for admission into this School.
- Z.—If the Applicant is fatherless or motherless, the surviving parent must be residing in the area within a radius of ten miles from the Liverpool Town Hell, and have resided within this area for, at the least, the twelve months immediately preceding the dails of application.
- 2.—If the Applicant has lost Father and Mother, the last surviving parent must have resided for, at the least, the last twelve months of his or her life, within the area defined above.
- 4.—Boys are admissible at eight years of age. Girls are admissible at seven years of age. No child is eligible for admission after the age of twelve.



REPORT FOR 1941.

THE Governors and Trustees have pleasure in submitting their Annual Report, together with the Statement of Accounts of Income and Expenditure, for the year ending December 31st, 1941.

The deaths of the following Governors and Trustees are recorded with deep regret:—Messrs. E. A. Woodall, H. Sutton Timmis, Enfield Fletcher and Wilfrid Bateson, while Mr. Frank Brocklehurst has resigned from the Board.

The following gentlemen were elected Governors and Trustees during the year:—Messrs. T. F. Tattersall, Wm. R. McGregor, Dr. John Hay, Laurence M. Synge and E. L. Boston.

During the year 36 children were admitted, viz., 27 boys and 9 girls, whilst 42 left the School, viz., 28 boys and 14 girls. There were 208 children in the School at the end of the year.

The ordinary income amounted to £10,160 15s. 9d., against an expenditure of £11,300 2s. 3d., leaving a deficit of £1,139 6s. 6d.

Legacies were received to the value of £1,160 8s. 10d.

It is a great pleasure to record the valuable services of the Ladies' Committee in superintending the general welfare of the children.

The Trustees have great pleasure in placing on record their sincere appreciation of the many valuable services rendered to the School by the Blue Coat Brotherly Society and the Blue Coat Girls' Society.

Since the last issue of our Annual Report many changes have been made in the arrangements for the education of the children. The presence of our children in the local schools was straining the available accommodation, and it was decided to rent from the Baron Hill Estate a house called "Bryn." Considerable alterations and repairs were necessary to make it suitable for a School, but these were effected, and the building now provides complete schoolroom facilities for both boys and girls. It contains large airy classrooms and is situated in its own grounds overlooking the Menai Straits. The Mission Room in Margaret Street has been retained and is now used as a Boys' Handicraft Room, while a new Science Laboratory has been equipped in Bryn.

The cost of this work has been considerable, but the Trustees are gratified to be able to report that the total expenditure and the annual rent of Bryn have been met by the generosity of a friend of the School who lives near Beaumaris and who has interested himself very keenly in the welfare and happiness of the children.

Difficulties of accommodation have also arisen in connection with the children's attendance at the Parish Church Services. The Rector of Beaumaris informed the Headmaster that he was unable to provide seating for the whole School at the II o'clock service, and as the Trustees felt it was undesirable to divide the School for Divine Service, other arrangements were considered. The friend mentioned above again came to our help and offered for our use the former Welsh Wesleyan Chapel in Church Street. The donor had the Chapel converted for use as a School Chapel and it was opened on Sunday, May 17th, 1942.

Service is held there on Sundays at II o'clock, and all friends of the School and relatives of the children are permitted to join the children at Divine Service,

It is difficult to express adequately the appreciation and thanks of the Trustees to this very generous "Friend of the

School," but one feels that the behaviour and deportment of the children and the care and attention given to them have brought in some measure their own reward.

We are sure that all friends of the School in Liverpool will receive the news of these benefactions with the greatest interest and with the deepest appreciation.

The children are still happy and comfortable in their billets, and we feel very grateful to those hosts and hostesses who have taken our boys and girls into their houses and looked after them so well. The various services for Health, Cleanliness and Clothing described in our last annual report are efficiently maintained, and it is largely due to these and to the good billets that the health of the children continues at a very high standard.

The absence of the children from Liverpool has not adversely affected the placing of them in suitable occupations. Of the last thirty boys who have left the School from Beaumaris, ten have been placed in good business offices in Liverpool, including Insurance, Corporation, London, Midland & Scottish Railway, Inland Revenue, and Ministry of Supply offices, while the remaining boys have been apprenticed to various engineering trades. Of these latter, three boys were selected by Messrs. Saunders, Roe & Co. Ltd., as apprentices for Aeronautical Engineering, and at the end of the probationary period in the training school they occupied first, second and third places in the final examination for the eleven candidates. These three boys are now in the engineering workshops. Three of the girls who left during the year took up nursing, one was apprenticed to hairdressing, and most of the others obtained posts in Liverpool offices, one in the offices of the Ministry of Supply.

Ample facilities are provided for both boys and girls for recreation—football and cricket for the boys, tennis and net-ball for the girls, and swimming for all. Practically all the children do a considerable amount of gardening, and the bigger boys have spent a great part of their holidays on the local farms.

A Home Guard Cadet Corps has now been formed in the School, and 46 boys have joined it, with their guardians'

consent. Mr. Watcyn, Senior Master, is the officer in charge, and Major F. Arnold highly complimented the boys on the valuable work they did during recent week-end operations.

Up to the present, in company with the Deputy Treasurer, Mr. H. P. Mounsey, I have been able to visit Beaumaris regularly, and we have seen the children at work and at play. We have also attended Services, both in the Parish Church and, more recently, in the School Chapel. Members of the Ladies' Committee have also paid regular visits.

We are all very favourably impressed with the efficiency of the existing organisation, and with the healthy and happy appearance of the children.

Dr. F. W. Dickerson is in charge of the office in Wavertree, where the business of the Hospital is conducted as usual.

The Trustees are greatly indebted to Messrs. Chalmers, Wade & Co. for their generosity in auditing the accounts and for other services rendered at a nominal fee.

THE 104th ANNUAL REPORT.

The Committee has pleasure in presenting to the Members and Patrons of the Society a Report of the work for the year ending 31st December, 1941.

The chief aim of the Society is to give a helping hand to the Boys who have been educated in the Blue Coat Hospital and are entering on their business life, by the exercise of a kindly supervision, by encouraging them in their efforts to attain success, and by the granting of assistance to them in time of need.

About 85 boys are under visitation and all appear to be doing quite well. Under present conditions the visiting of Boys is made more difficult, but the Visitors are doing their best, and the Boys' Club is a considerable help in keeping in touch with each boy.

During the year grants of suits of clothing and shoes have been made to 8 boys, as compared with the previous year, when grants were made to 21 boys. In addition, the grant of a suit and raincoat has been made to each of 23 boys on leaving school, as compared to 30 boys during the year 1940.

Special grants made during the year included educational, apprentices' tools, and £30 to the Junior Old Boys' Club.

The Income of the Society for the past year was £275 1s. 2d., and the Expenditure £259 1os. 9d., showing an excess of Income over Expenditure of £15 1os. 5d.

While this can be considered fairly satisfactory on the year, it must be pointed out that there is still a large deficit outstanding on previous years. The Committee therefore earnestly appeal to all members, especially those who have not subscribed during the past few years, to renew their subscription this year, so that this deficit may be made good.

During the year 7 new members have been elected to the Society.

In the interests of economy the list of members is being omitted from the Report during the War.

Many Old Blues are serving with the Forces, and our best wishes go out to them for a speedy and safe return.

OBJECTS.—To provide for the Educational, Social and Recreative development of the Boys, after leaving the Blue Coat Hospital, in furtherance of the work of the Blue Coat Brotherly Society.

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The year 1941 was a most difficult and trying one for the Boys' Club, which, like most similar organisations, felt the War effects more

than the previous year.

The year opened with Mr. West as Leader and Mr. Armstrong as Secretary, and the 1940-41 Winter Programme in full swing. Early in June, however, came the first break, Mr. West having to leave the City for business reasons. Mr. Armstrong then took over the Leadership, and Mr. Jones came in as Secretary. Within a very short time, however, it became apparent that Mr. Armstrong could not carry on, due to the re-organisation of a "blitzed" business and Home Guard duties. The size of the Club by now, however, had made it possible to merge for the time being the duties of Secretary and Leader, and Mr. Jones, with the full support of the Committee, undertook these duties.

The Membership at the opening of 1941 was 51, with an average attendance of 24, by the end of the year the number on the Register had fallen to 35, with an average attendance of 16. During the year 18 members were called to the Forces, and the very small number leaving

school was reflected in the number of new members joining.

Of our present membership over 50 per cent. are actively engaged on the Home Front, their duty rotas causing unavoidable absence on many occasions, and making the working of Club Programmes at times very difficult.

The 1940-41 Season, however, produced the following results:—

With the close of the Winter Programme, and the light nights, the Sunday opening of the Club finished, and we reverted to Wednesday and

Friday evenings, the Wednesday evenings being brightened by the advent of the Old Girls' Club, who, after losing their quarters at the School, decided to reorganise, and the Club was placed at their disposal. The Girls, however, stopped their Club Night when the nights drew in, and the Boys went back to Friday evening and Sunday afternoon.

The Club premises are also open to the Local C.D. each Tuesday, it being the desire of the Committee that the premises should be used as

much as possible, and in the best interests.

BLUE COAT J.O.B.C. SAVINGS GROUP.—June, 1940, was the month when Blue Coat B.C. decided to help in the "Save for Victory" campaign, and this they have done with a wonderful effort. At the present we have a membership of 35, and at the end of February, 1942, we had saved the sum of £270. Out of this, £245 has been invested in Savings Certificates. During Liverpool's "Warship Week" we put our "target" at £20 and finally finished the Week with the grand total of £49.

Camp.—During the year under review, the annual camp week was, through the kind generosity of Mr. Stuart Downs, was held at Pant-Dlu, near Mold. The camp was situated close to the Welsh mountain Moel Fammau, offering ideal surroundings and camping facilities. Thirty members were able to take advantage of this camp, and fully appreciated the arrangements made. The usual competitive spirit was encouraged,

which contributed to a great extent to the success and cleanliness of the camp.

This report would not be complete without our expression of appreciation to Mr. Stuart Downs, who has, for so many years, made these camps possible, and also one of the most popular activities of our Club. Our thanks are also due to the Secretary of the L.B.A., Mr. E. Jeffries Humble, and our caretaker, Mrs. Pendlebury, without whose assistance great difficulty would have been experienced in organising this camp.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to those subscribers and friends who have supported our efforts, also the Blue Coat Brotherly Society for their Grant, and we are indebted to "Anon." for a donation

of £25.

It is readily realised that the present time there are many financial calls on most people, and we feel confident that our work will continue

to receive support.

The subscriptions from friends show a reduction of $\pounds 2$ ros. 6d., and those from Members $\pounds 3$ 4s. 4d. on the 1940 figures. This we regret, but we are hopeful that with additional subscribers, members, and a fuller use of the Club room by the Local Defence Service, we will be able to maintain the present figures, and the Club, until we get a return to more peaceful times.

The personnel of the Committee has been changed once more owing to the calling up of members to service with H.M. Forces, and the thanks of us all are given to those Club members and Old Blues who are taking their places to keep the Club "flag flying"—a wish often expressed by so many of our active Service members now away, and to those who have gone to other duties we wish "God speed."



We regret that Subscriptions and Donations have shown considerable decrease, but trust this will be remedied when conditions become more normal.

Special efforts have been made to keep the working expenses at a minimum and so conserve the balance of funds at the Bank.

The Committee is grateful to the Ladies' Committee for their interest in the Society, to the Auditors, Messrs. Chalmers, Wade & Co., and to all friends who have given their kind support.

A last word to all members. Please support your Society until we can have our cheerful re-union, which, we trust, will be in the not too distant future.
