REPORT FOR 1949.

THE Governors and Trustees have pleasure in submitting their Annual Report, together with the Statement of Accounts of Income and Expenditure, for the year ending December 31st, 1949.

The deaths of the following Trustees are recorded with deep regret: The Rt. Hon. Viscount Leverhulme, Messrs. Fredk. Harrison, Robt. L. Holt, and J. Arthur Shone.

The following gentlemen were elected Governors and Trustees during the year: C. C. Martin, Esq., and the Rev. H. Ellis.

During the year 25 children were admitted, viz., 25 boys, whilst 79 left the School, viz., 22 boys and 57 girls. There were 132 boys in the School at the end of the year.

The ordinary income amounted to £12,369 6s. 5d. against an expenditure of £21,890 19s. 6d., leaving a deficit of £9,521 13s. 1d.

Following the resignation of the Rt. Rev. Bishop H. Gresford Jones, D.D., as Hon. Chaplain, the Rev. H. Ellis, M.A., Rector of Wavertree, accepted the Hon. Chaplaincy of the School, and the grateful thanks of the Trustees are due to him for his work both in the Chapel and the Classroom.

The Rt. Rev. The Lord Bishop of Liverpool (Dr. Clifford A. Martin) held a Confirmation Service in the School Chapel on Sunday, June 19th, when 24 boys and 11 girls were confirmed. The Trustees are grateful to the Lord Bishop for his continued and active interest in the School, especially for his monthly Holy Communion Service in the Chapel.

The Annual Blue Coat Service at the Cathedral on 30th October was very impressive, with a full complement of Day Boys joining with the Boarders in the Service.

It was a great pleasure to welcome the many representatives of the local Lodges of the Independent Order of Oddfellows on their annual attendance at the Shirley Hall Service.

The Old Blues' First Annual Commemoration Week-end was held on the 22nd, 23rd and 24th July. The Annual Speech Day and Prize Giving took place on the Friday, when the Lady Mayoress (Mrs. J. J. Cleary), accompanied by the Lord Mayor (Alderman J. J. Cleary, J.P.), presented the prizes. After Tea, a Masque was performed by the Boys and Girls on the School Field. The Annual Sports Day was held on the Saturday, and the Prizes were presented by the Lady President (Mrs. Norman B. Capon). On Sunday, at 11 a.m., there was a Commemoration Service, followed by Corporate Communion, in the School Chapel for past and present pupils, the Preacher being the Hon. Chaplain, the Rev. H. Ellis, M.A. In the afternoon the Old Blues' Service was held in the Shirley Hall, the Trustees in attendance were the Lord Mayor and the Hon. Treasurer.

As the result of rising costs and of the Education Act, 1944, reorganisation of the School became imperative. The solution that was finally accepted was worked out only after the most careful and faithful examination of the two-fold problems of finance and education, and after prolonged negotiations with the Ministry of Education and the Liverpool Education Authority. Briefly, the Scheme provides that the Blue Coat Hospital should be reorganised on the lines of a Bilateral (Grammar/Modern) Secondary School, that is, a Secondary School with both Grammar and Modern Departments, with "Aided" status, for Boys from the age of 11 years to 18 years, primarily for Boarders, though Day Boys would be admitted.

The Local Education Authority bears the whole cost of education. The administration of, and responsibility for the Charitable Foundation remains the complete and sole concern of the Governors and Trustees, and all the costs of Boarding, together with the facilities that go with a Boarding School, are borne by the Foundation Funds.

One of the results of the acceptance of the Scheme was that the Girls' School closed in July. This decision was inevitable, and was only taken with the greatest reluctance. The future of the girls was satisfactorily arranged. The Trustees were able to offer 20 Boarding places at the Royal Wolverhampton Grammar School, and 14 girls accepted. One

girl won a Scholarship to Howell's School, Denbigh, others desired to go to their parents and entered Grammar, Commercial and Modern Schools in Liverpool. All the girls were generously outfitted with clothes before leaving.

The services of the Ladies' Committee are most gratefully acknowledged in supervising the domestic side of the School, and for their advice and assistance in all that related to the placing of the girls. They have taken the greatest interest in the welfare of the girls since leaving, and by means of the Provident Fund have been of considerable benefit to those seeking their advice and assistance.

The new scheme came into operation in September. It is too early to form any definite opinion of the new School, but there is no reason to be dissatisfied with its initial working. The helpful and sympathetic co-operation of the Director of Education and his Staff has been a very material factor in the implementation of the School.

The thanks of the Trustees are particularly due to the Lady Mayoress, not only for her presence during the Commemoration Week-End, which was arranged to coincide with the last week-end of the girls at the School, but also for her charming invitation to take tea with her in her Parlour at the Town Hall on July 27th, the last day of term, and the personal interest she has been good enough to take in the welfare of the girls.

The Trustees are greatly indebted to Messrs. Chalmers, & Wade Co. for their generosity in auditing the accounts and for many other services rendered at a nominal fee.

The Blue Coat Hospital, Liverpool's oldest Foundation, has never been in greater need of financial support. The School with its high ideals of character training and traditions of service to the community and Merseyside needs the fullest possible support of its friends and benefactors if the present number of Foundation Scholars is to be maintained and eventually increased. The School is an ever-changing sphere of expanding and educational opportunities, and in order that these can be made available to an increasing number of Blue Coat Foundationers a special need is made for continued financial support. The Accounts have been beautifully bound in a leather binding, the cost of which was borne by C. W. Matthewman, Esq.

E. Shirley Jones, Esq., commissioned Miss Nora Heyson to paint two pictures—(1) Girls marching into the Chapel, and (2) Heads of three girls—and these were presented to the Trustees and now hang in the School.

Mr. H. Naylor generously gave flowers throughout the year for the School Chapel.

THE 112th ANNUAL REPORT.

The Committee has pleasure in presenting to Members and Patrons a report on the work of the Society for the year ending 31st December, 1949.

The chief aim of the Society is to give a helping hand to the boys who have been educated in the Blue Coat School and are entering on their business life, by the exercise of a kindly supervision, by encouraging them in their efforts to attain success and by the granting of assistance to them in time of need.

The past year has been a very active one for the Society as the changes at the School brought to the Committee and members many new problems. The departure of the Girls after nearly 240 years, although unavoidable, is regretted, but does not directly affect the work of the Society. The changes have, however, brought to the school new types of boys in the paying Boarder and the Day boy, but this does not mean that the work of the Society is to end, for the Governors have made it clear that it is their intention to increase the number of free places according to the degree of financial support received. There will, therefore, always be Blue Coat Boys in the original sense of the term, requiring the kind of help and advice that only the Society can give.

To mark these changes and particularly the departure of the girls we held our first Commemoration Week-end in July. With the very kind support and help of the Headmaster and Staff of the School an attractive programme was arranged.

Commencing with Prize Distribution at the School on the Friday afternoon, a Masque presented by the children was followed by a Whist Drive and Dance in the evening. School Sports Day was held on the Saturday, and on the Sunday there was Morning Service with Corporate Communion at 11 a.m. and a special service in the Shirley Hall in the afternoon. So successful was this new venture that it is proposed to make it an annual feature.

It will be appreciated that the full effects of the changes have not yet been felt by the Society, but it is interesting to note that during the past year only 12 boys came under our care as compared with 26 boys the previous year. The number of boys under visitation was reduced to 49, and reports on their progress have been made periodically throughout the year by their respective visitors. Boys desiring to change their employment have, generally speaking, sought our advice and guidance before doing so, and through our help several boys have entered the Merchant Navy.

During the year grants of suits of clothing and shoes have been made to eight boys as compared with twelve boys in 1948. In addition the Society has provided suits of clothing to 4 boys on leaving the School and raincoats to 2 boys as compared to similar grants to 26 boys the previous year. Special grants of sea outfits and educational fees were also made, while maintenance grants were greatly reduced.

The Income of the Society for the year was £369 3s. 9d. and the Expenditure £327 1s. 0d., showing an Excess of Income over Expenditure of £42 2s. 9d. as compared with the previous year when Income was £360 6s. 1d. and Expenditure £597 9s. 0d.

During the year nine new members were elected to the Society.

The Junior Old Boys Club while continuing to provide facilities for the educational, social and physical well-being of the boys, was greatly handicapped by reduced membership, due to fewer boys leaving the School, and by the discovery of dry rot in the Club premises at Lockerby Road. The rot had become so serious that several of the rooms had to be closed during the latter part of the year, and it was suggested that the premises be sold and new accommodation sought nearer the School. The activities of the Senior Old Boys' Social Club continued to meet with success.

Old Boys' Sunday was held in the Shirley Hall in February, and the Annual Remembrance Service in memory of Old Blues who gave their lives in the Great Wars, on Sunday, November 6th.

It is with deep regret that we record the death of Mr. H. J. Harding who died during his term of office as President of the Society, and of our Patron, Viscount Leverhulme.

The Society gratefully acknowledges the continued support and encouragement of the Governors and Trustees of the Blue Coat School.


