1. The Governors hereby engage Miss Husband as Matron of the Liverpool Blue Coat Hospital wherein she shall reside at a salary of $£ 200$ per annum payable by monthly payments on the last day of each month (but with no superannuation allowance) the Governors finding her proper board, medical attendance and laundry during the term of her engagement.
2. Miss Husband hereby accepts the post and agrees to be bound by the terms of this agreement and by the rules and regulations from time to time in force in the Hospital.

Miss Husband shall conform herself to all lawful and reasonable directions of the Ladies' Committee whether general or special as to the conducting by her of her duties and shall be in all respects subject to their authority and control.
