

REPORT FOR 1940.

THE Governors and Trustees have pleasure in submitting their Annual Report, together with the Statement of Accounts of Income and Expenditure, for the year ending December 31st, 1940.

The deaths of the following Governors and Trustees are recorded with deep regret:—Messrs. Thomas Holder and James E. Harvey.

The following gentlemen were elected Governors and Trustees during the year:—Messrs. J. Arthur Shone, Wm. L. Bateson, Alan S. Chambers, Lyle Dobell, Robert L. Holt and Wm. Sutcliffe Rhodes.

During the year 26 children were admitted, viz., 15 boys and 11 girls, whilst 52 left the School, viz., 37 boys and 15 girls. There were 214 children in the School at the end of the year.

The ordinary income amounted to £9,365 2s. 3d., against an expenditure of £11,786 18s. 3d., leaving a deficit of £2,421 16s. od.

It is a great pleasure to record the valuable services of the Ladies' Committee in superintending the general welfare of the children.

The Trustees have great pleasure in placing on record their sincere appreciation of the many valuable services rendered to the School by the Blue Coat Brotherly Society and the Blue Coat Girls' Society.

The School has now been in Beaumaris since September 4th, 1939. The first few months were very difficult—billeting was a new experience, and the children who had had such good organised care and supervision in Liverpool found themselves in other people's houses, mixing with other children in their daily lives, and rather lacking that authoritative discipline characteristic of their normal life in Liverpool.

The reaction to this was varied. In the majority of cases the influence of these new homes was very good and operated in such a way as to give the children a greater sense of responsibility and initiative.

As time went on it was possible to organise the essential features of the normal life of the School.

EDUCATION.—Accommodation for educational work is now fairly good, the chief disadvantage being that the classes are divided among five different buildings. One of these buildings, however, is an excellent Hall where the whole School assembles every morning for a short religious service, and where the Headmaster can receive reports and deal with all matters requiring daily attention. This Hall is also used for two separate classes for their ordinary school work and three classes are accommodated in the local Council School.

The Beaumaris Grammar School provides us with three class rooms, a Science Laboratory and Handicraft Room, and a local Sunday School has been equipped as an Art Room.

We have been fortunate in obtaining the services of temporary teachers (women) in the place of the four assistant masters now serving in His Majesty's Forces.

HEALTH, CLOTHING, etc.—Arrangements for these are now quite satisfactory.

The Nursing Home, under the care of the School Nurse and the Assistant Matron, is able to deal with all cases of illness, and there have been no insuperable difficulties.

All the children are medically examined once a fortnight and their condition is good and healthy.

A house in Raglan Street, besides providing an office and centre for the Headmaster, also provides workrooms and storerooms for the Seamstresses and Tailoress. Here, the clothing is collected from the Laundry and, after necessary repairs, is distributed to the children. Thus, the billeters are saved all the trouble and expense connected with the children's clothing.

A good bath room in the house provides bathing facilities for a large number of children who have none in their billets. Another room in this house has been equipped as a Dental Surgery, and a Dental Surgeon from Holyhead attends one day a week.

GAMES, RECREATION, etc.—During the black-out periods of the winter months little can be done in the evenings for the entertainment and recreation of the children. Good provision has been made for Football and Hockey, however, and the children have given some excellent concerts.

During the coming Summer the School has undertaken to cultivate several allotments, and this work, together with the usual cricket, tennis and swimming, will keep them well and profitably occupied. A local gardener has been engaged for a few weeks to organise and supervise the work in connection with the allotments.

I can assure you that the traditions, the character and conduct of the children is being maintained, and that the education has been carried out on lines fully equal to our past standards.

PRESENTS, etc., received during the year.

- Summer Holidays.—Shirley Jones, Esq., gave the sum of Fifty Pounds to be shared as pocket money by the boys and girls during the summer holidays.
- Christmas Holidays.—T. F. Tattersall, Esq., Woodgarth, Beaumaris, and Charles V. Taylor, Esq., Cranberry, Glyn Garth, Anglesey, gave all the boys and girls a Christmas gift of one shilling each.
- **Books,**—Shirley Jones, Esq., gave each boy and girl a Christmas Present of a book. The children have decided voluntarily to pool these books and to form a School Library which will be of great value during evacuation.
- Ladies' Committee.—The Lady President, Mrs. G. R. Mellor, treated all the children to the Pictures during Christmas Week. The members of the Ladies' Committee presented each girl with a Book as a Christmas Present.

THE 103rd ANNUAL REPORT.

The Committee has pleasure in presenting to the Members and Patrons of the Society a Report of the work for the year ending 31st December, 1940.

The chief aim of the Society is to give a helping hand to the Boys who have been educated in the Blue Coat Hospital and are entering on their business life, by the exercise of a kindly supervision, by encouraging them in their efforts to attain success, and by the granting of assistance to them in time of need.

During the past year 87 boys have been periodically visited at their homes and places of employment by their respective visitors.

The Committee regret that the Accounts for 1940, which had been prepared and audited, have been destroyed by enemy action and, therefore, we are unable to publish them with this Report. It can be stated, however, that the expenditure for the year has exceeded our income by about £50.

It must be pointed out that this deficit, together with that of previous years, has now placed the Society's finances in a very unsatisfactory position, and that new and increased subscriptions are urgently needed if the work of the Society is to be carried on. The Committee, therefore, earnestly appeal to Members and Friends for their help to place the Finances of the Society on a sound basis.

During the year grants of suits and clothing and shoes have been made to 21 boys as compared with grants of clothing and shoes to 24 boys in 1939.

In addition, the grant of a suit and mackintosh has been made to each of 30 boys on leaving School as compared with 22 boys in 1939.

Special grants have been made during the year of educational fees, overalls and apprentices' tools.

During the year 3 new members have been elected to the Society.

In spite of the difficulties brought about by the War the Junior Old Boys' Club continues to fulfil a valuable work in helping the boys, by providing them with opportunities for Educational, Social and Recreative development.

The Society is proud of the many Old Blues who are serving in the Forces, and our best wishes go out to them for a speedy and safe return.

OBJECTS.—To provide for the Educational, Social and Recreative development of the Boys, after leaving the Blue Coat Hospital, in furtherance of the work of the Blue Coat Brotherly Society.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

At the beginning of 1940 our membership was thirty-five. This figure fluctuated during the year but the average attendance was twenty-five and the total membership at the close of the year was forty.

In April, W. Hirst, G. T. Uren and S. Young gained awards in the Liverpool Boys' Association Essay and General Knowledge competitions. On the 17th May we held our annual Patrons' Night when Mr. Marshall presented the following awards:—

A. Johnson ... Marshall.

W. Hirst ... Ritchie.

W. Eaton won the Marshall Cup for the best all-round Club member.

During the summer we fielded a team in the L.B.A. Cricket League and finished the season third. Camp was held at Abergele, and as very few of our members were able to get away from work we invited Edge Hill Boys' Club to join us. Despite many added difficulties of rationing and transport twenty boys and two leaders had a very enjoyable week's camp and must again thank Mr. Stuart Downs for his generous help. On the only fine week-day (Monday) the whole camp turned to haymaking and cleared a field which would otherwise have been spoiled by the bad weather. The Camp football team played a local Searchlight Unit and won rather easily.

In September we commenced a full winter programme but air raids prevented members travelling to and from the Club. At the end of September we decided to open on Sunday afternoons only and this change has proved successful. We consider the Club is filling the gap caused by the absence of the Shirley Hall Service and at the same time is keeping the old boys together despite the war. The Club-house has been bombed three times but fortunately the damage has been confined to the loss of windows.

Since September we have fielded a football team in the L.B.A. League, and at the Club we have had visits from Edge Hill, Kensington, and Old Swan Boys' Clubs, with whom we have played an enjoyable series of indoor games. Each Sunday from 4-30 to 5-0 p.m. has been devoted to a communal half hour when we have been addressed by visiting speakers or have had discussions and debates. On one occasion

Mr. H. Hesketh gave a cinematograph exhibition. The Boys' Council has met regularly on the first Sunday of each month.

National Service being done by members includes Home Guard (20), Civil Defence Cadets (2), and A.R.P. Services (2). Of the remainder most members are required to work overtime at their jobs. In October R. Brocklebank and W. Hirst joined the Royal Navy, and W. Partington entered the Merchant Navy whilst A. Unwin qualified as a wireless operator. Other members cultivated the garden at the back of the Club for vegetables and also painted the front gates and railings.

We have compiled a list of eighty-three old boys known to be serving in H.M. Forces, and we are in touch with forty of these by means of the Club Magazine and a monthly news letter. This last is the work of Arthur Swinburn and its popularity is evidenced by the correspondence received. One old boy received a tattered news letter from another met accidentally during the evacuation from Dunkirk. Another letter was the means of informing an old boy serving in Egypt that his folk in Liverpool were safe although their home had been bombed.

A Savings Group was formed in July and is in charge of Gilbert McGeachin. Up to the end of December, £55 had been collected for National Savings Certificates, of which £29 was saved by Club members.

In presenting the accounts for 1940 it is gratifying to note that we have been able to maintain the interest of our subscribers, and although the total subscriptions show a reduction of £5 3s. od. on the 1939 figures this is accounted for by the fact that some subscribers are serving in His Majesty's Forces and we have been unable to keep in touch with one or two friends overseas—particularly we would mention Mr. W. F. Combes of Paris, an old Boy who has subscribed regularly since the Club was founded.

As the cost of moving into our new Clubrooms had not been cleared off in 1939 we made an appeal to friends of the School and Club in October. This resulted in special donations of £28 14s. od. We have to thank an anonymous friend for a gift of £15 during the year under review, and again extend our thanks to the Blue Coat Brotherly Society for their help in providing the Club-house and a grant of £30; to the Liverpool Boys' Association for a grant of £15 for black-out purposes; to the Liverpool Council of Social Service for a grant of £20 and the Liverpool Education Committee for £25 towards the cost of repairs. The temporary repair of war damage up to date had cost £10 10s. od.

The Club Committee, consisting of the Rev. R. Bruce Wilson (Chairman), Messrs. R. C. Burns, A. MacBeath, G. McGeachin, W. Jones, E. G. Armstrong, A. Swinburn, W. H. West and G. Sinclair (Boys' representative), has met monthly throughout the year, and in the unavoidable absence of our Chairman, Mr. Burns has presided. The present Club Leader would like to acknowledge the re-organisation carried out by Mr. J. McGeachin during the short time he was Leader, and trusts that whatever further losses in personnel the Committee may suffer in consequence of the War they will endeavour to carry on until peace is restored.


